



Demographics

Why do we look into data?

- 75,000 East Africans in Seattle/King County.
- 32% ELL Students at SPS East African home languages.
- Rainier Beach, Brighton, Rainier Vista, and High Point.
- Seattle Housing Authority- Top language is Somali.



Why, Seattle?

- Immigrant vs. Refugee
- ► 1960s & early 1970s: East African Immigrants Students.
- Late 1970s- Present: Random places of refugees by U.S. government.
- ► Family Reunification: Sponsor family members and relatives.



Who are *East Africans*, anyways?

- Burundi, Djibouti, Ethiopia,
 Eritrea, Kenya, Rwanda,
 Somali, Sudan, Tanzania, and
 Uganda.
- ► Horn of Africa: Eritrea, Ethiopia and Somalia (largest groups in Seattle).



Ethiopia

- Largest country in the Horn of Africa.
- ▶ 80 languages and 200 dialects spoken.
- Largest ethnic groups are Oromo 34.4% and Amhara 27%.
- Religion: Orthodox Christians 44%, Islam 34% and Protestant Christians 19%.
- Census: 151, 515 Ethiopia-born residents living in the US.
- Range of Economic Status





Hello in Oromo: Akkam

Eritrea

- Tigrinya 55% and Tigre 30%.
- The Tigrinya language official language.
- Muslim 50% and Orthodox Christian 40%.
- ▶ 8,000 residents in Seattle.
- ► Eritrean refugees came to Seattle between 1989-1993.
- Cultural Norms.
- New immigrants face the challenges of a new culture, language and different educational system.





Somalia

- Homogeneous ethnic population.
- Somali and Arabic.
- 2,000 years of interactions between indigenous peoples and Arab traders created Somali culture.
- 99% Sunni Muslims.
- Nomadic and islamic tradition.
- Clan system.
- Large and extended families.
- ▶ 30,200 residents of Seattle.
- ▶ 22 % SPS ELL students speak Somali at home.
